Top Ten Reasons to Consider a Federal Career

(modified from the Partnership for Public Services)

1. The Nation's Largest Employer is Hiring

- Half of the nation's 1.8 million federal employees may be eligible to retire in the next 5 years.
- Unlike some other employers, the federal government will never go out of business. It will always need good people to protect the interests of American citizens.

2. There's a Job for Every Interest

- There are federal jobs suited to every interest and skill, from architecture to zoology.
- You can combine your skills with your interests – for example, use your accounting background to improve your environment, your engineering degree to improve airport security or your biology degree to conduct cutting-edge medical research.

3. You Can Make a Difference

- The work that government employees do has an impact on the life of every American.
- You can play a vital role in addressing pressing issues, from homelessness to homeland security.

4. The Federal Government Can Help Pay for School

- Federal agencies may help you pay back your student loans if you work there for a certain length of time.
- Pursue a graduate degree, and your employing agency may just pick up the tab!

5. You Can Advance Quickly

- Federal agencies offer excellent training and development opportunities, and training can begin your first day on the job.
- There are a number of “fast track” possibilities for advancement within your field.

6. There are Federal Jobs Around the Corner, the Country ... and Around the World

- Over 16 percent of federal employees work in the Midwest.
- Only 16 percent of government employees work in the Washington, DC vicinity.
- Over 50,000 federal employees work abroad

- The federal government has steadily increased the diversity of its workforce.
- Federal agencies actively encourage minorities and individuals with disabilities to consider government service through a variety of internship and fellowship programs.

8. Federal Jobs Pay Better Than You Think

- Pay can increase pretty quickly for top candidates with strong education and experience.

9. Flexible Work Schedules and Benefits Encourage Work-Life Balance

- Flexible work schedules are a major upside for those with busy schedules.

Tips to Prepare for the Career Fair

You are likely to be attending the Career Fair for several reasons:

- You are ready for an internship or job and know the federal government has good opportunities; or
- You are ready for an internship or job and want to know what opportunities each agency has available now or in the near future; or
- You are interested in learning more about federal agencies: what they do, who they hire and whether you might be interested down the road.

If you are interested in obtaining an internship or job now or in the near future, we recommend that you:

- Try to review the website of an agency (or agencies) that interest you.
Recruiters have said they are impressed by the types of questions and general tone of discussions when students had looked at a web site ahead of time. Check <http://admissions.osu.edu/careerfair/> for details.
- Ask specific questions that are relevant to you.
For example, you might say, "I am currently a foreign language major. Are there particular languages that you are considering for your internships?" Or, "I would like to work in Ohio upon graduation. Does your agency have any job opportunities in Ohio?" Or "I am interested in the job we've just discussed. How and when should I apply?"
- Check the descriptions of all of the federal agencies attending.
You may be intrigued by agencies that you never considered.
- Attend the mini-sessions.
If there are particular agencies of interest to you, check to see if they are participating in a presentation session. Go to that session, *in addition to the career fair*, so you can talk to the agency representatives in 2 separate venues.
- Dress appropriately.
Business casual is fine. If you cannot wear business casual, look as neat as you can on a school day!
- Bring a resume if you have one, but talk to agencies even if you don't have a resume.
Resumes can be used as a basis for discussion. However, some agencies will collect resumes while others will not. (See frequently asked questions for more details).

If you are primarily interested in learning more about federal agencies and may investigation internships or jobs in the future, we recommend that you:

- Ask questions that help you decide whether your interests and/or your major lead to internships and jobs in the federal government.
- If you want additional information, ask the agency representatives about the best way to learn more. You might ask for a business card for future reference.

2. Do I need to bring a resume to the Career Fair or presentations?

Not necessarily. If you have a resume already created, you can use it to point out relevant experiences as you talk with federal agency representatives. However, if you don't have a resume, you should still attend the events. Federal agencies require on-line applications, so a written resume is not essential. (If an agency does not take your resume, do not be discouraged! A referral to apply online is a good sign!!)

3. Will the agencies be holding interviews on campus?

A limited number of interviews will be held on campus and additional agencies may be returning to OSU at a later date. Check with the agencies that interest you for details.

4. Why should I go to the Career Fair and/or the Presentations?

There are multiple reasons!

- Internships, internships, internships. Many federal agencies will be talking about internships! Internships are a great way to learn more about employment in your area of interest and often lead to full-time positions upon graduation.
- You will be surprised to hear about all of the interesting Federal opportunities! In addition, federal employment offers good paying jobs with great potential for promotions, terrific benefits, and job security. Now is a great time to learn what the federal government can offer you.
- Discover agencies with jobs in the Midwest, in DC, and internationally.
- Take the opportunity to use your talents and education in a career in public service – where you can make a difference in your workplace and for your country!
- Federal employment applications can be confusing – attending a workshop can give you a headstart on creating an effective application.

5. What should I wear to the Career Fair?

Business casual clothing is preferred if you are interested in an employment opportunity. Otherwise, neat, "school day" attire is fine.
